

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Otters help distribute nutrients into the environment and they balance fish populations so they don't grow out of control.








If there are no otters, that means the environment would be sick.

Just like if any animal went missing from the Earth.




Mama and Papa Otter live in a warm and cozy den near the river bank.

 $The\ pups\ squeak\ and\ squeal\ and\ roll\ all\ over\ each\ other.$




But they will be very hungry soon and Mama Otter needs to feed herself so she can feed her pups.




When she goes down to the river bank, she finds a strange new fish.




She starts to discover more and more odd looking creatures.

But the strange fish doesn't go down well. It's rough and hard and hurts her stomach.




She doesn't feel very full and she is still unable to feed her puppies.

Her stomach hurts and her puppies are beginning to lose their color.




 $They \ have \ nothing \ to \ eat \ and \ Mama \ Otter \ doesn't \ know \ what \ to \ do.$




Mama Otter visits her good friend Ms. Skunk. Mama tells her about the strange fish she has found.



Ms. Skunk says, "I have seen the ones who have brought those odd creatures to the river. They have scared away the trout and the perch."




"What am I going to do without the trout and the perch?" asks Mama Otter.



"You might go hungry." says Ms. Skunk. Mama Otter becomes very scared for her babies.




"What if we tell them to take their strange fish back? Maybe then the trout and the perch will return," says Mama Otter.




"We can't do it alone, I have some friends who can help us," says Ms. Skunk.



Mama and Ms. Skunk travel to different forest homes to tell their friends about the new strange fish and ask for their help.




She tells them her idea: Mama Otter and her band of forest critters will speak to the humans so they will remove the strange creatures that they introduced into the water.



 S_{o} , Mama Otter and her friends make their way to the city park.




The kids run around the playground with glee and their smiles light up the day.

A day goes by and Mama and Papa Otter are out of ideas. They snuggle their pups hoping the children will arrive.




Another day passes and Mama starts to lose hope.
